## From the Pastor...

We are so fortunate to have Dr. Mark Mueller as our new associate pastor. He comes to us from Swift Presbyterian Church where he has served since 1999 as solo pastor.

A native of Minnesota, Mark has a B.A. and M.A. from the University of Arizona, a Master of Divinity from Louisville Theological Seminary, and a Doctor of Ministry from Columbia Theological Seminary where he was a Thompson Scholar.

Mark is married to Toby Mueller who previously served as the associate pastor at First Presbyterian Church, Foley; she's currently the interim pastor at Providence Presbyterian Church. They have two daughters, Lauren, a senior at Converse College, and Ashley, a senior at Foley High School.

When Mark went to Swift Presbyterian there were 55 active members; today there are 350; the budget has tripled and the church's debt has been retired. Before going to Swift, Mark was the associate pastor at Spanish Fort Presbyterian.

What people throughout the presbytery have noted is Mark's mature faith and passion for ministry, particularly in the areas of evangelism, pastoral care, and teaching. He's a strong administrator, has a big heart and a wonderful way with people of all ages. Mark was an elementary school principal before entering seminary and has retained a keen interest in youth.

We are very excited about Mark's coming to Spring Hill and look forward to welcoming him to the pulpit on April 1.

**Molly's Musings**  
**"A Life of Love"**

**Be imitators of God, therefore, as dearly loved children and live a life of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.  
Ephesians 5:1-2**

What does it mean to live a life of love? This is a question I asked the youth of our presbytery this past weekend at their spring retreat. Jesus gives us a wonderful answer in John 13, "A new commandment I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

So what does that look like? How do we live out that commandment in everyday life? I think the first step to living a life of love involves a perspective change on people. As Christians, we must see the world as made up of two types of people: believers and nonbelievers. We must view the believers as our brothers and sisters in Christ and therefore the people we will spend eternity with dancing before the throne. Viewing your fellow Christians in such a light should be the first step in living a life of love. Your actions towards your brothers and sisters in Christ should flow out this perspective. If you view them as the people you will be in community with forever then you will also understand there is no room for unforgiveness, strife and discord. You will make every effort to make peace and unity a priority. You will choose not to be offended when otherwise you might be. You will accept one another, really listen to one another, and invest in one another. If we are to spend eternity together, we might as well begin building the kingdom here and now – and in doing so the watching world will know we are His!

We must also view unbelievers as people who desperately need to know Jesus Christ and our encounters with them as opportunities to witness to them about the love of the Savior.

From the plumber who comes into your home to fix your leaky toilet to the person who parks her grocery cart in the middle of the aisle in Wal-Mart, we have the opportunity to demonstrate through our actions the attributes of Christ.

I want the painter who disconnected the discharge hose to my washer and allowed 60 gallons of water to run through our brand new addition to see the patience and forgiveness of Christ in me. I want the photo shop cashier at Walgreens to see the kindness and compassion of Christ in me. I want my friends who are unbelievers to notice there is something different about me and my outlook on life. I want my life to reflect Christ so that all who cross my path know something about Him because of our exchange.

How would your life change if you viewed the world as made up of two types of people? I know that if I can remember to view His children in this light, I will come closer to obeying Jesus' commandment to live a life of love.

**Good Friday, with *St. John Passion***  
**Music Notes**

It has been customary in Christian liturgical history for Holy Week services to include the Gospel accounts of Jesus's last week. At some times and in some traditions, the Palm Sunday liturgy includes John's account and Good Friday's liturgy includes Matthew's account (in some traditions, the assignment is reversed.) Christ's Seven Last Words are combined from all four Gospel accounts. Through the centuries, the accounts have been presented in various ways--in simple reading, in chanted versions with several different singers representing the various characters, or in more or less elaborate choral settings. J. S. Bach's famous settings of the Matthew and John accounts are elaborate masterpieces in which the entire accounts are sung by soloists and choirs. The congregation joined to sing hymns strategically positioned in the account to assist in reflecting on the importance of the story for each person's life.

On this Good Friday, our congregation will be a part of the Christian tradition of hearing the Passion account according to John. Readers will present the Gospel story of Jesus's arrest, trial, and crucifixion, with different persons representing the different characters in the action. Our Chancel Choir will sing responses that reflect upon the action. For example, Peter's denial of Jesus is followed by a musical setting of a text by living writer David W. Romig, "When We are Tempted to Deny Your Son". One of my favorite texts is by the living hymn writer Fred Pratt Green; it helps us to reflect upon the torture of Christ by the soldiers. Its powerful language, in particular, the surprising rhymes, helps us to look at the event with new eyes and spirits. In the line "you will your robe of mercy throw around our naked shame," the warmth of the "oh" sounds in "robe" and "throw" as opposed to the relative brightness and implied ugliness of the words "naked shame" contrast Jesus's warm love with our sinful nature. This poem deserves quoting in full.

To mock your reign, O dearest Lord, they made a crown of thorns;  
Set you with taunts along the road from which no one returns.  
They could not know, as we do now, how glorious is that crown;  
That thorns would flow'r upon your brow, your sorrows heal our own.

In mock acclaim, O gracious Lord, they snatched a purple cloak,  
Your passion turned, for all they cared, into a soldier's joke.  
They could not know, as we do now, that though we merit blame,  
You will your robe of mercy throw around our naked shame.

A sceptered reed, O patient Lord, they thrust into your hand,  
And acted out their grim charade to its appointed end.  
They could not know, as we do now, though empires rise and fall,  
Your kingdom shall not cease to grow till love embraces all.

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The composer of the musical setting, John Ferguson, faculty member at St. Olaf College in Minnesota, says "the passion account of the gospel writer John depicts Jesus' death as his glorification and the cross as the victorious sign of the world's redemption." I invite you to join us at 7 pm on Good Friday to reflect upon and celebrate the triumph of the cross.

### Stephen Ministry

#### How does Stephen Ministry Work?

When someone requests a Stephen Minister, Margaret Miller, our Stephen Ministry Referrals Coordinator, will meet with that person, explain what Stephen Ministry is, and help determine whether Stephen Ministry is the kind of care that person needs. Our Referrals Coordinator then matches that person with one of our available Stephen Ministers. The Stephen Minister will then call that person and begin meeting with him or her for around an hour each week as long as the need is there. Everything a care receiver says to his or her Stephen Minister is kept confidential. The Stephen Minister doesn't try to solve problems; rather, he or she listens, cares, prays, and helps the care receiver find his or her path to healing and wholeness. He also trains and supports leaders for evangelistic outreach to the Siberian Unreached People Groups. Laurie works with an interdenominational Christian ministry that trains church and other professionals to confront the acute problems of alcoholism and drug addiction.

Alan and Ellen Smith, based in Moscow, are coordinators of the congregational twinning project in Russia and Belarus. They matched our church with our sister church in Kimry, Russia and assisted us in friendship and mission.

### Discernment and Biblical Literacy

What do Discernment and Biblical Literacy have in common? They both have been in current articles in news periodicals and denominational publications.

The General Assembly Task Force has reported a need for trust development through churches using new methods for handling controversial topics. Religious illiteracy among congregations is where professing attendees do not know the history and/or culture of various denominations, including their own. This has global implications.

Having attended a workshop during the educational conference regarding the use of better methods of exploring differences I have added the following books to anyone interested in exploring the implication of this condition: Morris & Olsen, *Discerning God's Will Together*; Johnson, *Scripture & Discernment: Decision Making in the Church*; Olsen, *Transforming Church Boards into Communities of Spiritual Leaders*.

In other areas, popular media is questioning the role of the church in teaching Biblical literacy. For better understanding of how and why this has become global for this country see this new addition to the library: Prothers, *Religious Literacy: What every American Needs to Know and Doesn't*.

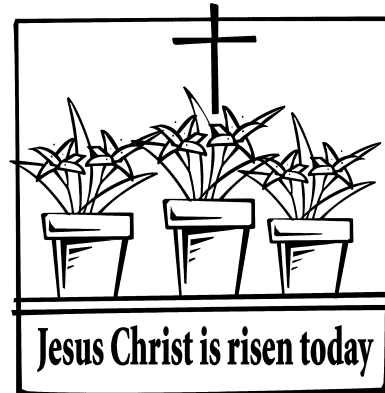
